



DON'T DELAY!

Dan Oldfield urges all pensioners to get their vote in **now for the latest stage of sharing the CBC pension fund surplus**

For the benefit of all CBC/Radio-Canada pensioners, CBC/Radio-Canada and the CBC Pensioners National Association (PNA) work in collaboration to navigate through the various steps required for surplus sharing.

This message comes from the CBC Pensioners National Association (PNA) which is the official voice for CBC pensioners. It should be noted the PNA has not been provided with any contact information for anyone who is not

a member of the Association. The PNA is solely responsible for the contents of this communiqué. However, its distribution is handled independently through the CBC Pension Plan Administration Team.

Voting to approve the distribution of about \$60 million of our pension surplus is fully underway.

Although online voting began in November, a work stoppage at Canada Post prevented delivery of paper cop-

ies of the detailed information and ballot. As of December 23, 2024, ballots have been mailed to more than 12,000 pension plan contributors.

About 4,500 pension plan contributors have already voted online to support the dis-

tribution, well short of the minimum 8,200 required for approval.

Dan from Page 1:

If you haven't submitted your ballot yet, please vote "yes" and mail it as soon as possible. And if you know anyone who has yet to act, give them a nudge.

In order to receive the money that is owing to us, two-thirds of all CBC pensioners must vote in support, whether or not they are members of

the PNA. Included in the count are deferred pensioners, meaning those who are not yet collecting their pensions.

If you voted online and did not receive confirmation, please vote again by regular mail. Any duplication will be sorted out through the counting process.

About 6,000 CBC pensioners and spouses are members of

the Pensioners National Association, but more than 4,000 retirees who are not yet members may not be getting timely or complete information. If you know anyone who hasn't joined us yet, please remind them to vote for the surplus payment, and urge them to join the PNA.

Big questions for Dan

Question – If the Conservatives win the federal election this year, will the CBC pension plan survive?

Dan – The short answer is yes. But how it survives will depend on what happens to the future of the CBC. If, as the Conservative leader has claimed, French services will be preserved, there would be a smaller number of contributors. The CBC Pension Board likely would make changes to its investment strategy, but the plan would continue in its present form. If the CBC/SRC was shut down entirely, the plan would be wound down as there would be no more employee/employer contribu-

tions. It would be managed in a different way although the goal would still be to provide the pensions as promised. We would no longer enjoy the benefit of pension surplus payments because that money would be reinvested, but the plan would continue. Pensions will be paid until the last CBC pensioner dies. Pierre Poilievre has talked about getting rid of the defined benefit pension plan for public servants and moving to defined contribution. That's like declaring war.

Question – What can you tell us about how the CBC is planning for a Conservative government?

Dan – They're preparing some broad discussion papers, but I don't know what the plan is for distribution. The fact is that the CBC is fighting for its life, and it needs to start defending itself. I understand the concern about appearing self-interested, but who isn't? When Poilievre talks about killing the CBC, but saving SRC, that tells me he doesn't know how the Corporation works. He's grossly uninformed and should be educated. And we all need to be educating people and getting ready to put questions to politicians because there is not broad support for getting rid of the CBC.

We need your help

The PNA National Advocacy Committee will be launching a *“Make Our Voices Heard”* campaign in advance of the looming federal election. The committee has prepared a series of discussion papers on issues we believe are relevant to our members. These papers will be rolled out twice a week by email and on our website soon. Now we need your help to turn a passive exercise into action on the ground. We will be sending you the papers in advance of publication so you can be prepared. Here are a few ways you can help:

Create a Chapter or Region committee to take the lead on advocating for your members.

Post the discussion papers on your social media pages. Invite comment.

Reach out to your members for first person stories that support the discussion papers.

Find out who your local allies are and look for opportunities to work together. (retiree groups, issue driven groups, political allies, etc).

Set up coffee or zoom gatherings to talk about the issues. Invite local experts. Seed the ground with the discussion papers.

Look for ways to communicate how your local CBC has bettered your community. What stories did it break or investigate that brought about positive change? Toot the horn! Let people know the value of the CBC and what they'd lose if it were to be defunded.

Who are the prominent leaders in your neck of the woods who came out of the CBC? Promote their stories. Reach out and ask for their support for a strong public broadcaster.

Attend your local all-candidates' meetings and ask questions – either the ones we've suggested or your own. Encourage all your Chapter and Region members to do the same.

Take photos at events whenever you can. Publish them in your newsletters and social media. And send them to us so we can share with PNA members across the country. We need to let everyone know we're on the case.

How can we at the National level help? What do you need from us to put these and other ideas into action?

These are just a few ideas. We know you will come up with more and we hope you will share them with us. We are creating a closed Facebook page for just that purpose. Watch for it. Sign on. Share your ideas. And let's make our voices heard!

Don't get scammed: protecting yourself from financial fraud

Unfortunately, as we age, we can become targets for financial fraudsters. However, the good news is that you can significantly reduce your risk by being aware and taking a few precautions. This blog post will arm you with the knowledge you need to stay safe and protect your hard-earned money.

Common scams targeting older adults:

The grandparent scam: A scammer poses as a distressed grandchild urgently needing money for bail, hospital bills, or car repairs. They'll plead with you not to tell their parents.

The romance scam: Scammers create fake profiles on dating sites or social media to build relationships and then ask for money for emergencies or investments.

The lottery scam: You receive a notification that you've won a lottery or prize but must pay a fee upfront to claim it.

The government imposter scam: Someone claiming to be from the CRA, Service Canada, or another government agency demands immediate payment for taxes or fines.

The tech support scam: You receive a call or pop-up message claiming your computer has a virus and must pay for remote tech support.

Ways to protect yourself:

Never give out personal information over the phone, email, or online unless you initiate the contact.

Don't get scammed from Page 5:

Be suspicious of unsolicited calls, emails, or mail.

Don't be pressured to make quick decisions. Take your time and consult with someone you trust.

Verify the identity of anyone who contacts you claiming to be from a government agency, bank, or other organization.

Don't click on links or attachments in emails from unknown senders.

Keep your computer and software up to date with security patches. Shred documents containing personal information before discarding them. Monitor your bank accounts and credit card statements regularly.

What to do if you think you have been scammed:

Contact your bank or credit card company immediately.

Report the scam to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre (CAFC) at 1-888-495-8501 or online at antifraudcentre-centreantifraude.ca.

Contact your local police.

Key things to remember:

You are not alone. Many people fall victim to scams.

Reporting scams is important, even if you don't lose money. This helps authorities track down scammers and prevent others from being victimized.

If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

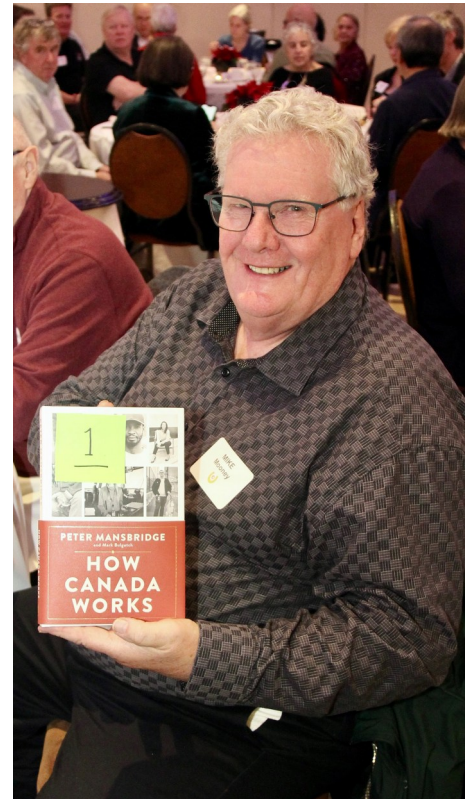
